

President O'Kelley called the meeting to order at 10:15 a.m. He appointed Joe Gable parliamentarian for the convention. Mimutes of the 1962 convention, held at Raleigh, N. C., were read by Executive Secretary Butler, and approved with the addition of the following: "Brother Kutschinski gave a financial report."

Executive Secretary Butler gave a financial report, showing a balance on hand at the First National Bank of South Carolina (at Clemson, S. C.) of \$501.47. He also gave a report as to the progress in the area of national expansion, and showed the brochure that had been mailed inviting other schools to form chapters. Brother Eagle suggested that the fraternity send delegations to prospective schools to promote expansion. After a discussion, he so moved. There was no second, and he withdrew his motion.

In the following years, N. C. State has undertaken a building program that has now relieved the overcrowded situation. With the help of our advisor, head director of music at N. C. State, J. Perry Watson, we have regained a room in Pullen Hall and have converted it into a music lounge for all of the members of the musical organizations to enjoy during the day and for Mu Beta Psi to use at night for meetings, receptions for visiting musical organizations, and any other occasions that might arise. Mu Beta Psi has furnished the room, and the brothers are responsible for keeping the room in order The door has been painted fiery red in the tradition of the fraternity colors, and a shield of the fraternity and a nameplate indicating that the room is a music lounge will be installed a little later in the

The new music lounge is well used, and we hope that all the members of Mu Beta Psi who have not yet seen the lounge will be able to drop in and visit with us.

President O'Kelley relinquished his chair to Vice President Daniel and gave a report on progress toward securing an official fraternity in. He read a letter from the L. G. Balfour to giving suggested specifications. He resumed the chair and called for discussion. If the a lively discussion, Brother Cato moved that the basic triangular design, as originally suggested by the Executive Committee be mainained. The motion was seconded and passed.

At this point Brother Halverson brought up the question of voting eligibility. It was lecided to vote in a body, unless voting by official delegations to the convention (two to each chapter) was called for.

Brother Cato moved that the design of the in should be limited to three letters of the raternity inscribed at the points of the riangle. The motion was seconded and carried. Tresident O'Kelley asked if the type of jewelry should be limited. Brother Inglis moved that the pin should be limited to a red enamel background, with silver letters and a border of pearls. The motion was seconded and carried manimously.

Vice President Daniel asked for an interpretation of membership requirements as set forth in the national convention. He moved that the constitution be interpreted by the convention that the only membership requirement imposed be the two year tenure of membership in a recognized college musical group. Any additional requirement may be imposed by a local chapter providing they are coherent with the national constitution. Brother Rish seconded the motion and it carried.

Brother Cato moved that no national treasury funds be allocated for 1963 convention expenses. The motion was seconded and carried. Vice President Daniel expressed a desire for the national executive committee to investigate the copyrighting of the fraternity name and decal.

He so moved. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Brother Eagle moved that the 1964 National Convention be held at Myrtle Beach, S. C., during the week of June 1-8. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Brother Gable moved that the president appoint a committee to draw up a proposed initiation ritual for honorary members to be presented to the 1964 convention. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. The president appointed the new executive committee to act in this capacity.

The floor was opened for nominations for national officers for the 1963-64 school year. Brother Ralph Daniel was nominated for the office of president. Brother Inglis moved acceptance by acclamation. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Hugh Turner was nominated for the office of Vice President. Brother Eagle moved acceptance by acclamation. The motion was seconded and carried unanimously. Nominations for members-at-large were: Ted Halverson, Chuck Cato, Gene Eagle, Philip Inglis, Milt Turner, and Tommy Mathews. Brother Gable moved that nominations cease. Motion seconded and carried unanimously. A motion to accept the entire slate was not seconded and died. It was decided to elect two members-at-large from each chapter. Gene Eagle withdrew his name from the slate, leaving Chuck Cato and Ted Halverson automatically elected from Alpha Chapter. For Delta Chapter, Phil Inglis and Tommy Mathews were elected, with only Delta Chapter members voting.

Brother Kinard moved for adjournment.
The motion was seconded and carried unanimously
