#### NEWS FROM ALPHA CHAPTER

Mu Beta Psi's Eighth Annual Hootenanny was a big success. It was held on the Upper Intermural Athletic Field on Saturday night, April 17, 1971, in connection with All Campus Weekend.

President Joe Morgan appointed Al Marshall as Chairman of the Hootenanny Committee. His assignment was to organize the event. He appointed as committee members David Mosemen, John Conway, Jane Pickard, Kathy Rockefeller, and Susie Pope.

The All Campus Committee was very favorably inclined toward the idea of having another Hootenanny during All Campus Weekend. Al Harshall recieved from the committee a date, and a time, an appropriation of \$410, and a recommendation that he begin to organize. Rob Ford, a student advisor in the program office, was a great aid in providing him with information.

All the arrangements were made for auditions: date, time, place, sound equipment, judges (from the psi), forms, and a great deal of publicity. Eighteen acts appeared on the nights of auditioning. From those the judges chose eight: two guitarists Carol Williams, and Danny Tickel; one male vocalist, Robert Starling; one female vocalist, Susan Paris; and four groups, Tower, NES, Rum River Crooks, and Opus. There is alot of talent on their campus; therefore the judges had a difficult time with the auditions, which were great.

For several weeks before the auditions Al Marshall had been looking for an M.C. He inquired with Donn Key, afriend, who was doing night club work in Atlanta, but recieved no reply. By the time of the auditions he talked to John Pfefferkorn whom he knew by reputation only. John Pfefferkorn and his brother appeared in the Winter Arts Festival. John was adament in wanting

to be in the Hootenanny that he auditioned for a place in the show. However, Al was so inspired by their performance that he offered them the M.C. position, which they graciously accepted.

Jane, Kathy, and Susie found judges for the Hootenanny. Mrs. Bliss, Mr. Adcock, and Burn Richards of the North Hills Record Bar formed the panel of judges which did a great job. The judges sat on blankets on the ground just in front of the sound control equipment so they had an excellent view.

The Hootenanny was free to N. C. S. U. students and their dates. Special tickets were made for others such judges, Music Department officials, and those in performing groups who were not State students.

Publicity for auditions and for the Hootenanny were prepared for: the Green Sheet, the Campus Crier, the Technician, and posters for the dorms. Since the show took place on Saturday night, sound, lights, and stage were already on the field and were manned by members of the All Campus Committee. The Hootenanny Committee was therefore not troubled by those arrangements except to be certain of them.

Alpha chapter welcomed its brotherhood back to school with a picnic last
fall. Their membership includes twenty
active and fourteen honorary brothers.
There are several reasons for the small,
but dedicated active membership. First,
a very large number of the brothers were
seniors and graduated last hay; secondly,
the pledge classes last year were small.
They did not have a pledge class last
semester, but this semester looks more
promising—they have sent out one hundred
and sixty bids!! Indicat ons are that
interest is high among those who recieved
bids.

Early last semester Alpha decided to increase the size of its treasury by involving the membership in some project. They accepted all the responsibility of

doing all the work necessary for setting up and taking down the stage for all music concerts. The music department then pays them according to the contract which they have with them. They are still providing free ushering for all music department sponsored programs as a further service.

Friends of the College (FOTC) is the world's largest subscription concert series. Of the five student positions on the board of directors, three of them are active Psi brothers: Duane Evans, Robert Howland, and Carl Dawson. Alpha has hosted two receptions for the artists who performed for FOTC: Tyrolerfest; and the Westminster Chorale, under the direction on Mr. Roger Wagner. These receptions were of great enjoyment to both the performers as well as to the brothers. They are looking forward to more of these opportunities to meet some of the world's most outstanding performers.

Alpha chapter has become particularly aware of their honorary brothers this year. They have sent them special invitations to their meetings and activities, and continued efforts are being made to further involve them.

### EDITORIAL

Well, Brothers and Sisters another year has gone by and "The Clef" still hasn't been fully resurrected. The blame lies in three areas: 1) The National Editor, 2) The National Committee, and 3) YOU. After recovering from my own general apathy concerning "The Clef", I realized that the National Committee has set no format or deadline dates for our national publication. Upon sending out requests to all chapters for information, only two replies were recieved. You will have to admit that didn't leave much to build a newspaper on.

Since it appears that no recent editor of actives have been able and/or willing to devote the necessary time to "The Clef" some change must occur in the manner that the newspaper is handled. My recommendations are as follows:

- 1) the responsibility of publication be appointed to one chapter instead of one person.
- 2) The responsibility rotates each year to a new chapter.
- 3) There should be three specific dates for publication and if they aren't met the Mational president should find out why.

4) A basic format be decided upon by the National Committee.

The purpose of giving the editorial job to a whole chapter is an effort to overcome apathy on the part of the individual. Their main goal in relation to the National would be the publication William Beauchaine of "The Clef". The rotation of the responsible chapter would serve to keep "The Clef" from becoming stagnant. Chuck Hershberger Mandatory dates and formats would give the responsible chapter guidelines on what and when to publish. My personal recommendation for dates are Fall (Sept. 15), Winter (Jan. 15), and Spring ( (May 15). The content of these should be at least a statement from the president in the fall, one from the vice-president and secretary on expansion in the winter, and the publication of the convention minutes in the spring.

Each active should have read this before March 18, 1972. Give this and your own ideas some thought before the convention. You could be the next editor!
