Greetings!

The office of National Vice President of Expansion has been extremely busy (translation I have been busy). A reflection of this is the latest addition of Sigma Chapter at St. Louis University.

Much can be learned from this colonization both from the new Brothers as well as those who had hands in it-Host Pledgemasters: Haley Vingsness (Zeta) and Laura Kelland (Alumni Association/Nu Alum), Big Brothers (host chapters and remotes), committee representatives to the National Committee on Expansion, the Board of Trustees, and finally the individual Brothers overall.

I was contacted in Fall 2007 by an excited (then sophomore) Meghan Garvin. The timing couldn't have been more challenging as we were in the middle of requests from Northern Michigan University and Mari-

etta College as well. It was decided by the NCE to notify each school of their order and a timeline to attempt a chapter should they remain interested. Rho was installed in Fall 2008. Marietta was an attempt (a Sigma Colony) that didn't work out. During the time of the Marietta attempt the students at SLU were hard at work on a petition (Spring 2009).

I, along with Omicron Alum Anna Gonzales, visited the excited students and met the equally interested advisors. I warned them of the hard work ahead but truly was excited by the diversity and enthusiasm this group held. I took that information back to the committee and we searched hard for two host chapters. Zeta and Alumni Association took up the call and provided host pledgemasters.

The summer was spent quietly working on what would be only one of many revisions of by-laws and setting the training schedule. Classes began at SLU and we confirmed the actual numbers along with a couple of incoming freshman. Big Brothers were set and training began.

The colonists at SLU attended their meetings and took their quizzes throughout the fall 2009 semester. As with any trainee (or pledge) there were the questions and doubts but through their (and the Fraternity's) hard work we were able to gather together on November 6, 2009.

It was a late night but very close. We all learned more about each other, Brotherhood, Service and Music. Sigma Chapter of Mu Beta Psi was officially opened with 14 Brothers in the early hours of November 7, 2009. Hugs and cheers abounded as the tired Brothers said goodnight and stumbled off to sleep (or the airport).

The weekend continued the fun as those who could joined the visiting Brothers for a trip to the zoo, dinner at a local brewery and finally the City Museum. It would amuse many to have seen Brothers of all sizes and ages crawling through, up, in and around the 7 story building serving as a playground for adults.

The opening of Sigma Chapter does not signal the end for the NCE. We are still quietly reviewing schools that may interest Mu Beta Psi as possible expansion sites, in particular in the New York State area. Also the office of National Vice President of Expansion is open for election this March. I have offered any assistance to candidates and also warmly invite interested individuals to the NCE meetings.

Skeletal Bylaws Committee Update

Brothers,

With the recent additions of Rho and Sigma Chapter to the Fraternity, the Host Pledgemasters, NVPE Guthrie and President Cooperman noticed that the skeletal bylaws given to each colony upon which to base their own bylaws were somewhat out of date. To fix the situation, President Cooperman created the Skeletal Bylaws Revision Ad-Hoc Committee, which I was asked to chair.

We've accomplished a great deal in the past few months. We've completed an initial pass at four of the nine Articles in the initial document. The largest challenge we've faced is striking a balance between leaving plenty of room for future Colonies to customize the bylaws to suit their needs and spelling out everything for them. We've compromised by creating a top sheet to attach to the Skeletal Bylaws. This top sheet is essentially a road map, pointing out every blank space we left for the Colony to fill, as well as providing a list of additional things the colonists may wish to add or revise. The committee will also be recommending that copies of each Chapter's bylaws be sent along with the Skeletal Bylaws and top sheet as sources of inspiration and reference.

The Skeletal Bylaws are an important part of the expansion effort, as they provide the rebar upon which the foundation of every Chapter is built. With the responsibility of revising such an important document, our committee is taking our time to ensure that we get everything right. Our target goal for completion is Convention 2010, and we welcome input from any Brothers who have extensive experience with bylaws and policy. 
National Information Technology Committee Report

If you had to pick five words to describe yourself, what would they be? How many of these would you consider: musician, volunteer, student, Brother, Chapter Representative, Officer, friend, alumnus/alumna, worker, teacher, confidant, socialite?

All of these concepts represent roles we play as Brothers: within our personal relationships with each other, within our involvement at our Chapter and university, and within our National Organization. Sometimes we fill one role, sometimes several at one time. Some of us have been playing these roles for a long time, while others (such as the new Brothers as Sigma Chapter – welcome!) are new to their roles. Yet all are important, and all help make up the fabric of Mu Beta Psi.

This winter, I will be undertaking a new way to display information on the Intranet: one that takes into account that we each play different roles within the Fraternity. The goal is to help us connect with the information we need in each specific role we play, so we can be more effective in our collaboration. Although the structure is still being determined, it will involve the ability to create *Workspaces* for each of the groups we participate in (such as a Chapter, a local or National Committee, or even affinity groups, such as "Fans of Reggae"). Within those spaces, man-

agers will be able to assign *Roles* to people with different per- missions associated with each role. Each space will be able to pick from a list of *Features*, such as a discussion group, a calendar, a Knowledgebase, a shout-box (like a Facebook *Wall*), and more. The plan is to also provide support for custom-coded, and even 3rd party widgets (such as an iGoogle widget) to embed as a feature. Best of all, control over the groups (and their users) will reside with the group administrators, which means each group can customize the experience to meet their needs.

Alpha Chapter interviewed Aaron McClannon.

A: Why did you become inactive?

AMC: I became inactive around 2005 when my grades and personal issues finally took their toll.

A: What could we be doing better? Any advice for us?

AMC: Alpha has the bad habit of letting a few people do the lion's share of work. Let's try to get all Brothers as actively involved in functions, assignments, and projects as possible.

A: What do you think the Brotherhood has improved on since you were active?

AMC: Alpha has improved on meeting deadlines and doing things they say they'll do. The fact Alpha has won some National prizes and commendations speaks for itself.

A:If you could change one thing about the Brotherhood as you know it, what would it be?

AMC: If my time as a Brother has taught me anything, it's that the Brotherhood can and will change on a regular basis. More often than not, poor or maladaptive changes get weeded out naturally in the functions. I'd say the Brotherhood is as it needs to be currently.

A: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? Why? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity?

AMC: This is a hard question. I do worry that the Fraternity is growing rather quickly. As such, the National organization doesn't have time to adapt properly to the demands of so many newer Chapters. I would love to see the names of Chapters require double letter designations, but I want to see each Chapter be as stable as possible.

A: What is your view on the current debate in the Alumni Association regarding whether AA should stay as a Chapter or should lose its chapter status and become a diffuse organization of alumni?

AMC: I have very mixed emotions. On one hand, I enjoy the continuation of the Brotherhood into the AA. However, I think one thing that's hindering membership to AA is that it's still trying to run like a collegiate chapter, and given that a large national organization often relies on its Alumni networks, membership is a strong necessity of a living Alumni Organization.

MU: Do you think we're doing all right? Is there something that we've improved upon? Any advice for us?

JG: Wow... This is a tough one to really comment on. If I take "we" to mean National, I'd say we're doing okay. We've opened a couple new Chapters, but have let a number of them die as well. Communication seems to be pretty decent, but I think less of it is face-to-face these days, and that's less effective. If I take "we" to mean Mu, I don't know as much as I'd like. I know that the Chapter has had issues maintaining a robust number of Brothers and continually seems to be carried along by a few very zealous Brothers and attended by a couple who don't have as much else to do. We still (from what I can tell) suffer from pledging some of the "superstars" who then find that they don't have the time or dedication for it that they thought they might, and little to nothing is done to try to help encourage or enable them to remain active. I'm not trying to sound harsh, I just remember the days when I had a pledge class of 7, and we contributed to making an active Brotherhood of more than 15 at the time. I doubt I'm the only one who has some concerns about the upcoming Convention, but I'm reserving judgment. I might be a little different from some other alums, in that I've been active a few different times, so I got to see more than "my own" spate of Brothers.

MU: If you could change one thing about the Brotherhood as you know it, what would it be?

JG: As *I* know it (bearing in mind that I may be wrong here) there has been a difficulty in gathering the Brothers together as often as we seemed to. It was tough to find many of us walking around campus without running into another Brother and joining them for food, a movie, hanging out, what have you. I don't know if it's still like this, but the more recent meetings and brothers in general that I've experienced seem to be so over-extended that they either can't or won't make Psi one of their priorities, and that's sad to me. I totally get needing to do other stuff. It was somewhat like that when I first started, but we've definitely started doing a lot more together. It helps that we're involved in a lot of the same organizations. <voice age="old">When I was *your* age,</voice> that was one of the things I really enjoyed about Psi: it was hard to be somewhere and NOT see one of my Brothers around. We ate together, had some classes together, were in some clubs/organizations together (Pauper Players), and hung out in each others' dorms/apartments/libraries/the union together. NU: Do you keep up with goings-on in the Fraternity?

SL: Yes! I have tons of friends who are active Brothers. The Brothers are trying super hard to be on top of their requirements and make sure we're taking quality pledges who will benefit the organization. I see things differently now that I'm an alumna. As an active Brother, every little thing that happened seemed like the end of the world, but now I see the big picture. I come to the events to see everyone that I miss, not for the logistics. Sometimes, though, people get distracted by little things that aren't important. I also think the active Brothers should do more to include their alumni, because we want to feel involved even though we don't always have time to be.

NU: If you could change one thing about the Brotherhood as you know it, what would it be?

SL: I think the Brotherhood is founded on some really amazing things that I would never want to change. The only improvement I could make is to give everyone a sense of unity, because ultimately, every member of Mu Beta Psi has the same goal.

NU: Do you think the Brotherhood has changed for the better or for the worse since you stopped being active? Why?

SL: In all honesty I think there are a few things have changed for the worse since I was last active. Since a ton of Brothers left Nu Chapter at the same time, it left holes that special active Brothers had to fill. Because we have special active Brothers sitting on committees, it is harder for those committees to meet and do their assigned jobs.

In the last few years I have noticed that the feeling of family and unity has declined. There has been a shift in the atmosphere surrounding meetings and the Brotherhood in general since I became a Brother and I know many alumni see this too. There are many Nu Chapter alums who are not interested in keeping up with the Fraternity for a number of reasons. I think this is one of this Chapter's biggest downfalls. I know what it's like to get busy and have a lot going on outside of Psi, but when alumni completely give up on the Fraternity, that is a problem that needs to be addressed ASAP. We need our alumni in order to understand our history, which is essential to improving things for the future.

Brotherhood, loyalty and trust are the virtues that we hold dear in this organization and they must be at the core of everything that we do. We need to uphold the four purposes in the most brotherly way possible, while keeping traditions that are dear to many Brothers and helping to give the future Brothers the best possible experience they can have in Psi. The Fraternity is a Brotherhood, not just an organization, and it is not about anyone's personal agenda; it is about the group as a whole.

NU: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity?

SL: As a proud Brother, I don't think we should ever stop expanding. As long as we have Brothers willing to help with the expansion, it can only be a positive thing. We are trying to create brotherhood among musicians. This Fraternity changes people and gives people a voice when they might have never had one. We should never set a limit on how many Chapters should be installed (obviously there needs to be a limit on the amount within a short period of time). I will never look at expansion in a negative way.

bonding without as much bickering as I seem to remember from some crowds.

MU: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? Why? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity?

JG: I think expansion is all well and good, but if we're losing chapters while we're expanding, the net result is nil. I think we need to work on strengthening our foothold in existing universities as much as possible, *then* branch out to other areas. I know we've kind of allowed expansion to happen when folks come to us with interest, but I think we'd be better served to try to be a little more geographically discriminating, to allow there to be "strength in numbers", for lack of a better term. For example we have 2 chapters in the RDU area. Who else can we attempt to add there? We have a strong chapter in the UP of Michigan. Who else could we talk to up there? It's hard to expand when your base isn't stable.

MU: What is your view on the current debate in the Alumni Association regarding whether AA should stay as a Chapter or should lose its chapter status and become a diffuse organization of alumni?

JG: I think I would ask the question "What does AA gain from being a full Chapter? What would it lose from not being a full Chapter? Which benefits the Brotherhood (both active and alum) more?" and then move to meet the needs best. But hell, there's no reason that the chapters shouldn't be using the alums more as a resource than they do.

MU: Brother Gloege, what does Brotherhood mean to you?

Omicron Chapter interviewed Tammy Guile.

O: Do you keep up with goings-on in the Fraternity?

TG: I mostly keep up with my fellow Omicrons. I think the Fraternity is doing well, but it would be nice if more Brothers were active on the Intranet. That is a huge improvement from when I became a Brother. Also, it's nice to see that where things have gone wrong in the past, there are Brothers trying to fix the problems. For example, Jen Staten has improved the office of National Treasurer a great deal. As a former treasurer of Omicron Chapter, I can say that it helps the individual Chapters quite a bit.

O: Which aspect of this Fraternity do you think needs the Brotherhood's attention most urgently?

TG: I think it differs for different Chapters as we're likely all weaker on different things. So when it comes to the Brotherhood as a whole, it seems like sometimes we end up covering each others' weaknesses. But if I had to pick something, it'd be initiative. I'm really happy that SLU got through the installment process. I know there was a great deal of work that went with that, and I know that when I was an active Brother of Omicron we went through some scrutiny for not being able to step up to a challenge. So I guess that makes it initiative and following through on promises.

O: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? Why? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity? **TG:** Yes and no. There are positives and negatives to both. It's nice being a small Fraternity. When I went to convention in spring '08, not everyone in the Fraternity was there, but I felt like I got to know more people with only six active Chapters at the time plus some of the alumni from various Chapters there. And with me being a rather shy and introverted individual, that number of people versus some of the numbers of larger groups is a lot more comfortable and more like family. At the same time, expansion would be nice as well with spreading our values and what the Fraternity is about to other schools and regions that have not had opportunity to interact with us in the past. Having more chapters brings in more people with more ideas and opinions about things. This would help us strengthen ourselves.

Rho Chapter interviewed Andrew Smith.

RHO: What do you think the Fraternity is handling well? What could we be doing better?

AS: I dig that both the Chapter and the Fraternity as a whole are expanding, I'm very excited to see more and

more people getting involved. I'd like to see more service functions in general. I think it's important we make opportunities to give back and get some positive publicity in the process. That being said, it looks like Rho is doing a better job already of increasing service opportunities since I've been there — I just want to see more!

RHO: If you could change one thing about the Brotherhood as you know it, what would it be?

AS: I'd make it somewhat more visible to the public. You know, sponsor more concerts and functions, maybe even taking a role in advocating for music education in front of a state Legislature. Flex some muscle.

RHO: Which aspect of this Fraternity do you think needs the Brotherhood's attention most urgently?

AS: Music advocacy is definitely a huge thing right now, especially as schools lose more and more money and start eyeing budget cuts. Done properly, I think Mu Beta Psi could have a real chance to make a difference for a lot of young people. Which, in the long term, means great recruiting opportunities down the line, but let's go one step at a time here.

RHO: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? Why? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity?

AS: I dig expansion. We're a fairly small Fraternity thus far and I would love to see more people getting the chance to see what we're about. That being said, I don't want to see Mu Beta Psi growing to the point of becoming a party culture and drawing negative attention to itself — just big enough to have a big impact on campus and in the community.

Pi Chapter interviewed Ivan Chen and Chris Leong.

Pi Chapter has a unique story, just as each Chapter of Mu Beta Psi does. Like Zeta Chapter, Pi was once a stand-alone organization (Mu Upsilon Alpha), but in the fall of 2007, we merged with Mu Beta Psi to make a name for Psi at Rutgers University. I decided to give my discussions with fellow Pi alums a distinctive taste of Pi by structuring these discussions around these Brothers' first encounters with the Brothers of Mu Beta Psi as well as their thoughts on how far we've come since deciding to make ourselves a part of the extended, loving family of this national Fraternity.

My first subject was one of the first Pi Brothers to acquaint himself with the Brothers of MBPsi while MYA was looking for a national home. Ivan Chen (pledged spring '06) was one of the party to travel down to National Convention at Delta

Chapter in 2007, and shared his first impressions of what was then a group of incredibly welcoming strangers—strangers who would soon become his Brothers.

PI: So, tell me about some of your memories of Convention in 2007. What sticks out?

IC: I remember being serenaded by the Zeta Brothers. They sang "You Are My Sunshine" to us. That was so cool. I also remember sitting in on a meeting and being shown the actual crest.

PI: What were your first impressions of the Brothers?

IC: Everyone was real warm and welcoming. Very friendly in all respects. Sarah (the NVPE) was our guide and we clung to her like a lifeline whenever we felt lost

PI: What were your expectations going into this situation? You were traveling to a strange place, about to meet a bunch of people you didn't know, and you didn't know how they would receive you either.

IC: I wasn't really expecting too much, because a previous meeting with another fraternity we were considering (Kappa Kappa Psi) hadn't gone so well. But I'd heard good things about Mu Beta Psi prior to the trip. Still, I didn't keep any hopes up and I didn't know how much we would be able to see. I was pleasantly surprised by the amount of access we had at Convention. I wanted to understand what they were all about and what they were doing as an organization.

PI: Right. I can understand why you were holding back, since Chris and Christian had come back from the Kappa Kappa Psi convention with tales of being barred from several meetings to which they'd originally been invited. And we were really looking for a group that shared our values. Anything else that sticks in your mind from that first Convention?

IC: Mascot wars! They hid a rubber chicken from the President.

Ivan's experience encapsulates a difficult and ambivalent time for those at Rutgers. We were looking for a national home and scared to put ourselves out on a limb for Mu Beta Psi after being coolly welcomed at the Kappa Kappa Psi convention. But Ivan's fears were dispelled by the Psi Brothers, who welcomed those from MYA as their own.

My next discussion was with Chris Leong, a longtime Brother of Pi Chapter, who is still a striking presence around Pi and an asset to younger Brothers seeking advice from an older Brother who pledged back in the fall of 2001. Chris represents a bridge between times: before installation and after installation. I specifically sought him out for his thoughts on Psi. It also helped that he was a friend ages before I became his fellow Brother.

PI: What were your thoughts on the merger?

CL: It was a difficult situation for me, not being active at the time. There were times where it was an effort to understand the difficulties involved. Overall, though, I wanted whatever the active community felt was best for the future of our Chapter.

PI: Did you have any hopes or misgivings/suspicions about handing ourselves over to Mu Beta Psi?

CL: I wanted to know that despite the name and affiliation change, that day-to-day life with my Brothers would be pretty much the same.

PI: What have you seen change since we became Pi Chapter?

CL: Hmm. I've had to become used to the fact that I have Brothers from out of state, which is a change for me and for the rest of Pi. I've seen my younger Brothers meet the out-of-state Brothers with such enthusiasm—it's very uplifting. There's more procedure with a national [organization], but that's to be expected and when I sit down and actually take the time to understand it, it's all very functional.

PI: What was it like to meet non-Pi Chapter Brothers?

CL: It was a little strange, but at the same time very encouraging. You have to remember: the time while I was pledging and active there was no national, so the pool of Brothers was much smaller and the experiences much more similar. Between the merger process and Convention there was an amusing barrage of encouragement and curiosity. The Brothers I met at convention were all so excited and curious to learn about us as a new chapter. To meet new Brothers from other colleges and experiences was a little overwhelming, but everyone was so welcoming that despite the differences, it still felt very familiar. Except for all the abbreviations. Like NEC or...

PI: NEC, NCE, NCCM, BOT, NFC, etc., etc., etc.

CL: It was a blur of faces and abbreviations, I had no idea what any of these meant so I felt like people were speaking another language at first. My first memory was being yanked into the Alumni Association meeting with Christian on an hour's sleep and being talked into activity despite having no idea what I was getting into.

Overall, my discussions revealed personal insights that I hadn't previously known and gave me a new understanding of how these two particular Pi Brothers experienced our chapter's first year as a part of Mu Beta Psi.

Alumni Association interviewed Kappa Alumnus Crorey Lawton.

AA: Why did you become inactive?

CL: Lots of moves made it hard to keep in touch. I am an archaeologist; I spend a lot of time out of the country. A lot of my organizational ties went out the window. I have been out of music while I finish my dissertation, but I plan to be a musician—it keeps me sane.

AA: Do you keep up with goings-on in the Fraternity?

CL: Through Ben and Amanda Griffeth, and a few friends immediately after graduation, but it's been minimal. They provide the opportunity for continued participation, Brotherhood and fellowship. The interview jogged my memory for others.

AA:What do you think the Brotherhood has improved on since you were active?

CL: The Fraternity has a large presence online.

AA: If you could change one thing about the Brotherhood as you know it, what would it be?

CL: I would focus more on alumni. Reaching out to them is really important to me. It's good to see a rekindling of interest in something that has long been dormant.

AA: What lessons do you think the Fraternity should take from Kappa Chapter's life?

CL: Kappa and Mu Beta Psi would have been well-served to reach out to the alums right afterwards and forge a strong link. The Kappas were so involved in developing the Chapter that they didn't have a focus on alums, and they didn't have alums at the time. Developing a sense of history would have been huge – sustained growth won't happen, but can be well-served to develop the institutional memory.

AA: Do you think we should continue our expansion efforts? Why? What do you think is a good size for the Fraternity? **CL:** Strictly for entertainment (insert a Pinky and the Brain moment): yes, expansion is the only way to go. CM becomes a social exercise in maintaining the status quo, and Expansion brings in fresh blood. First Kappa, then the world! Clemson was a huge help to Wofford in expansion — they helped with growing pains. They made sure that several Chapters are in each region to help each other. The question comes down to how much mentoring can each Chapter provide to each colony? It has to be viewed on a regional level, meaning what can each Chapter do and what can each region sustain?

AA: Should we colonize new, or recolonize?

CL: If the program wasn't strong enough to sustain a chapter in the past, then keep checking on it to make sure there's no new interest (AA should be on this) but focus on new colleges.

AA: What is your view on the current debate in the Alumni Association regarding whether AA should stay as a Chapter or should lose its chapter status and become a diffuse organization of alumni?

CL: I have seen organizations where alumni have much more power—that's the wrong way to go. A simple confederacy of alumni is also the wrong way to go. A separate Chapter might be the right way to go, as long as the amount of influence is limited, but someone needs to maintain the institutional knowledge. It has to go beyond being just like college. If alumni of one of the active chapters are able to visit, it gives them a bit more influence. There's not a lot of focus for inactive chapter alumni to rejoin the group.

AA: What is your favorite Mu Beta Psi moment?

CL: The trip to Houghton for National Convention in 1991ish!

AA: Do you think the Brotherhood does an effective job of communicating with its Alumni? What would you like to improve? Do you stay current with your fellow Alumni, and would you like help doing so?

CL: I haven't heard anything except through Ben, so no. I would definitely like to be more connected. I was surprised that it was on Facebook – social networking helps, and I haven't had the idea to reconnect with the group until I thought about it now.

AA: Within the AA, should there be a committee to focus on each individual chapter's alumni?

CL: No − no need to Balkanize the AA, since it's a national group. ■

The Roots of Country Music

Country Music is the red-headed step child of the music world. It is the exception, as many people "like pretty much any kind of music except for Country" (though to be fair, rap will usually be included in the exceptions list) and Country tends to have a stigma attached: people assume Country Music is for uneducated Southern hicks and cannot possibly be *real* music.

Let's take a trip back in time, shall we? It's the 1920s, and the music industry has stumbled across an untapped resource: Hillbilly music. Test recording sales show that there if records are produced, they will be bought, and suddenly the Blue Ridge Mountains are flooded with talent scouts looking for "authentic" mountain music. Thus the founding fathers (and mothers) of what we today call Country Music were discovered, and thus many of the stereotypes of Country Music were born.

As the industry picks up steam, we start to have a bit more diversity. We now have hillbilly recordings, singing cowboys, and brother duets. We see common lyrical content with the African-American music style of Blues, and in fact, in the 1920s and 1930s, there wasn't much of a distinction between Blues and certain Hill-billy recordings; the concept of music genres belonging to a particular race came much later. We see a mythological element arising in the biography/hagiography of artists where, in their youth, an old African-American Blues singer or guitarist takes the artist under his wing and teaches him how to sing and play guitar, the most famous of these young artists being Hank Williams, Sr.

Now in the mid 1930s, Western elements started becoming more central to the slightly more cohesive Country genre. This is where the term Country-Western comes from, which applies only to this time period, not to the modern genre of Country. This is also the era of Western Swing, a new style combining swung eighth notes, rhythmic upright bass, melodic violin, and in some cases, a brass line.

From this style, a new, more edgy style is born, called Rockabilly. Rockabilly uses something previ-

Reflections from Christian D. Kutschinski in a letter to Louie M. Wigington, Treasurer of Delta Chapter, dated October 19, 1942:

"The fall term is always a hectic one for me, but this year seems to be the worst one ever. I have seldom been able to retire with a clear conscience before 1 or 2 p.m. since school opened. How much longer I can stand the pace I don't know, but soon the football season will be over, when I hope I can slacken up to a human pace.

"I am proud of my band boys. They have made a wonderful start this year, and I believe it is the best State College Band I have ever had. The spirit is the most wonderful I have ever known, and I give Mu Beta Psi credit for this unusual spirit, for they are the back-bone of the leadership among the band boys, and they certainly have done wonders in developing this fine spirit which is providing the finest cooperation I have ever had here. Do you blame me for being willing to sit up will 2 "peeyem" night after night working out spectacular shows for them to put on when they are so willing to stick by me to put them across with such precision as to cause everyone to sit up and take notice and talk about their fine work as they have during the last two weeks -- (it was called to my attention that Wade in the Charlotte Observer this morning in his "Monday Morning Quarterback" column credited the band with "grabbing highest honors" or "stealing the show" or something like that). I just can't seem to get time during the day to concentrate on working out these maneuvers for them, so there is nothing to do but tackle the job when I am through with everything else. (Only trouble is I never really get through, but at least I can stick with a job without being interrupted by conferences, phone calls, rehearsals, etc.).



ously unseen in all of the proto-country styles: percussion! It maintains the swung rhythm of Western Swing, but adds more horns as well as piano. And just like anything that goes against tradition, the youth loved this music. It was the best dancing music around. Take, for example, the repetitive yet catchy song from the Vonage commercials, "Woo-Hoo." This is a remake of a rockabilly song by the Rock-a-teens. How about Bill Haley and The Comets' "Rock Around the Clock?" Don't forget the man in black, Mr. Johnny Cash. And I'm sure everyone's listened to Elvis Pressley before. Most people don't know that The King, at his start, was technically a member of the Rockabilly genre. Rock 'n

Roll was born from Rockabilly. What many scholars will point to as the first Rock 'n Roll recording ("Rocket 88" by Jackie Brenston) was, in its time, a rockabilly hit.

As you follow the history of Country music, you see the same things found in other genres' histories. The struggle for "what is authentic" is the same struggle that bore the Punk Rock movement (which originated at a Country, Bluegrass, and Blues bar), and for a brief period of time, there existed a hybrid of Punk Rock and Country

called Alt Country. So the next time you turn on your radio and listen to Zeppelin, be sure to think of and thank Johnny Cash, Bob Wills, and Jimmie Rogers for laying the groundwork. And the next time you start to scoff at Country, pause and think about the common roots it shares with Blues and Rock.

Why Can't I...?

In this section, the NITC Chair answers some common questions about the Intranet.

...change my email address on the Intranet?

Because the Intranet requires you to have a valid email address on file, in order to change your primary email address, you have to first add a new email address using *MyProfile*, and make it your primary email address using *MyAccount*. Your password will be reset and a new one sent to the new email. Once you log back in, you can delete the old email address.

...receive messages from the National Listserv?

Subscription to the national listserv is NOT automatic. Because of our Privacy Policy, each user must request to be subscribed to the national listserv. You can do this in *MySubscriptions* in your intranet profile. You can also unsubscribe from here as well.

...ever find out about when my committee meeting is? I'm the rep, but I don't get emails.

You may not be listed as your Chapter's rep on the Intranet. Check out the "Email Who's Who" link to see whether you're set up as your Chapter's rep. If not, contact your Chapter President, MAL, or NITC rep and ask them to fix it under **User Manager -> Chapter Officers**

...change the list of who is active at my Chapter within User Manager? I'm the MAL but I can't submit the changes!Unfortunately, the algorithm that handles the "make active / make inactive" feature for multiple users is not functioning. You can, however, click any user's name to view their profile in another window. You can then edit their activity within their profile by clicking the icons next to their Chapter info.

...get a response to my emailed question?

If you've emailed webmaster@mubetapsi.org and haven't gotten a response within 24 hours, one of two things likely happened: 1) I'm swamped and haven't gotten to your message yet, or 2) I didn't see it. I get a LOT of email (including a lot of spam!), which unfortunately requires that most of my email go through my spam folder. Sometimes I miss them. Sometimes my email volume is such that your message dropped off page 1 very quickly. For this reason, help requests are best sent through the Intranet Helpdesk. You can access it by clicking on the "?" icon in the upper right of any page. If your problem involves not being able to access the intranet, then please send a follow-up message. If you still don't get a timely response, sic the National President on me (president@mubetapsi.org). I
