National Historian Report

For this report, I wanted to highlight some of the things I have been working on over the past several months. First, in the spirit of working to achieve some of the mid-to-long range goals for the Fraternity Archives, I was able to secure a temperature-controlled storage facility for the hard-copies of our historical records. Working with National Treasurer Jen Staten, I was able to find a 5 x 5 unit at a reasonable price (under \$70 per month) in Chantilly, VA, located about 15-20 minutes from my home. The first year is completely paid for (plus they were kind enough to waive 2 months' rent as a good-will gesture). The majority of the Archives has already been transferred to the facility, although the remaining filing cabinets have not been moved as of yet.

Secondly, I purchased additional protective sleeves for our older documents. I can now report that all of the C.D. Kutschinski Papers have this valuable protection, and are now organized chronologically in three ring binders, allowing for easier accessibility in the future. It is my hope that this will allow some of our most valuable documents to be preserved for years to come!

Third, I have researched some of our older documents and came across some interesting facts and footnotes about our history, which I have used to develop the next three Historian's Corner columns for *The Clef*, including the one for this edition. Be sure to check them out!

Finally, I have been assisting the Acting National Secretary by saving transcripts of the past several NEC Meetings and preparing the Minutes for the committee. I am glad that I have been able to assist with this task and will continue to do so for as long as needed. In addition, any Brothers who are interesting in running for the Office of National Secretary: please do not hesitate to contact me with questions. It is an office that I have some familiarity with and I would be than happy to pass on some tips and tricks for anyone who wants to undertake it! \square

National Information Technology Committee Report

Last issue, I wrote about a proposed re-writing on the Brothers Intranet. The plan was to create an environment based upon teams, with each team having its own Workspace where members of the team can collaborate. The goal was to improve collaboration within specific groups, while providing greater local management of information.

I'm pleased to share that rather than developing our own custom solution for this new model, I've identified an off-the-shelf solution that meets all of our primary needs, and comes with a development environment that will allow us to fill in the blanks.

The solution is called LifeRay Portal, and it's a pretty robust environment. It's divided into organizations (corresponding to our Chapters), and Communities (corresponding to our National Committees, or any other type of group you can imagine). Each organization or community can have a public area and a private area for members only. Through portlets, administrators can add forums, document repositories, wikis, polls, and more. It also has a profile system and built in Facebook-style chat.

More importantly, the software is commercially supported, meaning it will continue to be developed, lowering the risk for obsolescence (which we encountered on our current setup), and it's extensible, meaning it can be upgraded without disturbing customized code.

Right now, I'm working on porting over our user database, which is one of the biggest challenges we'll encounter. Once that's done, I will be setting up the National Organization and a few sample communities for local developers to use as models. Then the site will be opened up to NITC reps and National Committee chairs for their evaluation. The hope is to have at least a rudimentary implementation by Convention 2011. Porting over our existing intranet data (forums, etc.) may take a little longer.

With this new system, we will be in a better position to maintain our Internet presence in a way that is user-friendly and easy to manage. Stay tuned for more details! \square

That one song that gets stuck in your head for hours, days, weeks? Or maybe it's just one stanza or a verse, or even just a couple of notes? Repeating *ad nauseam*, running in dizzy circles around and around your ears, driving you absolutely bananas by the end of hour 493?

You, my Brother, have an earworm. Besides being consummately irritating, earworms are a real psychological phenomenon that has been studied by various important sciencey folk. No, really, it has. The term, a literal translation of the German *Ohrwurm*, was made popular by a marketing professor called James Kellaris. His studies showed that approximately 98% of people have experienced an earworm.

Daniel Levitin, a cognitive psychologist, neuroscientist, musician and record producer, also delved into the study of earworms. He has published numerous articles on the relationship between neurocognition and music, and he is the author of *This Is Your Brain On Music: The Science of a Human Obsession*. He has also worked with artists and groups such as Steely Dan, Santana, The Grateful Dead, The Blue Öyster Cult, Stevie Wonder and Chris Isaak.

If that isn't enough for you, the well-known neurologist Oliver Sacks also researched earworms in his 2007 book *Musicophilia*, contributing the title "involuntary musical imagery" to the list of earworm synonyms.

Some other fun synonyms are "humsickness", "repetunitis", "sticky tune", "brain itch", and my personal favorite, "tune wedgie".

So how do people get earworms (hereafter called tune wedgies)? According to Kellaris and Levitin, any song can become a tune wedgie. But there are some characteristics that make a song particularly prone to worming into your ear. Songs that are simple (lyrically and musically), repetitive, and contain some unusual feature (like an extra beat) are most likely to become tune wedgies. Some people (musicians and those who are chronically stressed, tired, neurotic) are more prone to getting tune wedgies than others. This, says Kellaris, indi-

cates that they are the result of a complex interaction between musical (and lyrical) properties and an individual's traits.

Okay, you say. I'm one of those lucky people who get tune wedgies *all the time*. So how did it get there? More importantly, how do I get rid of it?

Patience, young Padawan.

When you listen to a song, a part of your brain called the auditory cortex is activated. The same area is reactivated when you just imagine hearing the song. This retrieval of auditory input—whether it's a tune wedgie or not— can be called "perception in reverse", because it follows the same neural path as actually hearing a song, but backwards. This mirror-image of activity, Kellaris believes, is part of why tune wedgies get stuck so deeply.



All the explanation you really need.

The first and most common way to get a tune wedgie is simply hearing a song. This will trigger the auditory cortex and boom, insta-wedgie. But it doesn't have to be an entire song. Often, it's just a stanza, a line or even just a few notes. But once that wedgie digs in, it takes days of picking to get it out.

The second way is subliminal, or lyrical, exposure. This happens when you read a word—any word and it reminds you of a song lyric. Which turns into a tune wedgie. Some good examples include "stop" (in the name of love), "one" (is the loneliest number), "blue" (da ba dee da ba di), and "never" (gonna give you up, never gonna let you down). Got a wedgie yet?

I wish I could tell you to hang upside down from the archway of a cemetery gate while eating strawberry yogurt and twirling your feet in circles and your tune wedgie will go away, 100% Guaranteed Or Your Money Back. I wish I could say that because it would be hilarious to see, but also because we all want that one real tune wedgie cure. But sad to say, there is no tried and true way to cure a tune wedgie. Each one has its own cause and came to you for its own reason, so a panacea is, unfortunately, out of the question.

But there are some things that you could try, and I swear I am not making any of this up:

1. Eat hot cinnamon candy. The intense flavor evidently distracts your brain.

2. Listen to the song all the way through. Once.

3. Listen to another song by another artist.

4. Distract yourself with physical activity, like skydiving. But beware, the wedgie may return once the adrenaline wears off. Works with less death-defying activities too.

5. Drink alcohol (works like a charm).

6. Pass it on— sing your tune wedgie to a friend. However, they may become an ex-friend when they walk away humming it.

7. Play music; piano seems to work best.

8. Go to the Eiffel Tower. According to earwurm.com, nobody has reported having a tune wedgie on this structure. And because I found it on the internet, you know it's true.

9. Listen to "Staying Alive" by the Bee Gees. If your tune wedgie endures, despair not. It will go away in time. If it does not, however, you may have a condition called endomusia, wherein the sufferer actually *hears* music that is not there. Endomusia is related to obsessive-compulsive disorder in that it is a type of persistent, recurring thought. It is also classified as a type of hallucination in that the auditory cortex is activated as it is when one actually hears music, not in the perception-in-reverse way that results in tune wedgies.

If you are interested in learning more about tune wedgies and various other intersections of music and psychology, I recommend grabbing a copy of *Musicophilia* by Oliver Sacks (Knopf, 2007) or *This Is Your Brain On Music* by Daniel Levitin (Dutton, 2006). Or you could check out earwurm.com, which has resources to help you identify and get rid of those pesky wedgies.

THE HISTORIAN'S CORNER

A snapshot of the early years, Part I:

In an expansion letter dated February 5, 1949, Major Kuschinski provided a brief overview of the early years of the Fraternity. Now, over sixty years later, it provides a valuable chronology that is worth sharing with the Brotherhood.

"We would all be happy to negotiate with you with a view to installing a chapter of Mu Beta Psi on your campus, but I want to tell you frankly that we are not a large national fraternity - yet. We hope to add chapters from time to time, and I think the best field for expansion is among schools of our type, as I think we have mutual situations and problems that differ from those of purely fine arts institutions.

The whole story in a nutshell is this, and I want you to know the real situation, so you will not be expecting to get into something big and glamorous, but by affiliating with us you might be doing a fine thing to help your set-up and be an inspiration to other institutions on your way to follow suit and help Mu Beta Psi become an important factor in schools of our type out west, and gradually build it up to a large national organization.

Summarizing briefly the history of Mu Beta Psi: It was founded here by my predecessor about 1925. Two years later another chapter was installed at Davidson College. A year or so later there were negotiations for the installment of a third chapter, but their records are not very clear for that period, when as you remember a lot of things happened -- depression, banking holiday, etc., including the loss of our funds in a bank failure, and the death in 1933 of my predecessor, P.W. Price, founder of the Fraternity. By that time the Director of Music at Davidson left, and during those crucial years of 1930-'34 they had no director and no one to foster the interests of Mu Beta Psi, and that chapter fell by the wayside, for, by the time I arrived on the scene here there was not a single member of Mu Beta Psi left on Davidson campus. When James Christian Pfohl assumed directorship of the Davidson Music Department, he, being a Phi Mu Alpha (Sinfonia) member, naturally chose to install a chapter of that great musical fraternity rather than revive Mu Beta Psi, so Beta Chapter was a dead issue ever since."
