uring my undergraduate years at Zeta Chapter, I always knew my Brothers were just one phone call away. Whether I needed help digging my car out of a pile of snow, putting together a resume, or just venting about my day, I always had twenty people on speed dial. I knew I could call any brother at any chapter for some brotherly TLC, but I didn't fully grasp the magnitude of the national love and support I have until I moved to Maryland in 2016. Before a trip to visit my new graduate school, I reached out to the Mu Beta Psi - Washington DC/ Baltimore Facebook group. Brothers I had never met offered to answer questions and meet up. Even though I had never lived anywhere close to the area, I quickly had advice from locals about places to live, navigating public transportation, and how to transition from being a Midwest Collegiate Brother to an East Coast alumnus. By the time I moved to Maryland months later, I had a new support network of local brothers, and I'm still meeting brothers all over the country through our many Facebook groups!

We have over one thousand brothers in our biggest Mu Beta Psi Facebook group, but we also have many smaller regional groups. From the Atlantic (Mu Beta Psi - NY/NJ/PA) to the Pacific (Mu Beta Psi - West Coast), brothers can meet up and share local advice. As Zeta Brother Christian Pirie said, "Social media definitely makes it easier to talk to basically anybody I need to across chapters or in school." However, we don't limit our Facebook advice-giving by map boundaries! We have Facebook groups for all brothers providing every



kind of support imaginable. For example, career-minded brothers can go to Mu Beta Psi Professionals for resume help; brothers hitting the gym can join Brothers Getting Chiseled to share progress pics; and brothers in need of a

digital shoulder to cry on can head over to Help for a Mentally Better Psi for a prescription-strength dose of heart reacts.



Having a place to go to just let everything out without judgment has been so helpful to me, therapeutic even. Being able to discuss those struggles, trade tips and advice, share coping techniques, even just having someone who can empathize with you is phenomenal, and I really hope it has helped other Brothers as much as it has helped me."

According to Zeta Alumna Hannah Kowalewsky, having a Facebook group for the recent Centennial Committee, "stirred up discussion at times, and it is interesting to see Brothers from many Chapters chime in and give opinions." On that note, I had the great opportunity to attend the Durward W. Owen Risk Management College in Indianapolis, IN, once again this summer. This year, I chose to attend the track intended for traveling consultants (individuals who travel to collegiate chapters to ensure compliance and provide support from the national organization) and was very grateful for the eye-opening experience, especially after attending a different track last year that was directed at senior leadership. My biggest takeaway revolved around the generational gap in knowledge that occurs between collegiate members and members of senior leadership/alumni regarding the culture as well as societal impacts of being in a Greek organization.

It's not always easy to be a member of a Fraternity. We are constantly battling the stigma that comes simply because we choose to use Greek letters to define our purpose.

Although we know that being a member of a Fraternity grants us the privilege of a network of likeminded individuals as well as a platform to serve our communities, most of us have experienced disdain from others regarding some aspects of Greek life that typically aren't accurate.

As an honorary, co-ed, organization full of musicians, we are lucky. We don't face a lot of challenges that larger, social-based Greek organizations do--we have never had to file a claim with our insurance and we have never had to close a chapter due to hazing or substance abuse allegations. However, we still operate as a fraternal organization and use the Greek letters Mu Beta Psi to identify ourselves. Because of this, we have to recognize what it means to today's current and incoming college students to be in a Fraternity or Sorority and how to respond when the inevitable questions arise.

Don't forget that anyone can access our Fraternal Life and Conduct Guidelines online on our policy website!

Regardless of this stigma, we will continue to serve music and create chances for musicians to bond. We will continue to create new Chapters and help fund projects for musicians in need. We will continue to do good and promote the arts in the best way possible, through fraternity.

I hope you all have a wonderful Fall training new Brothers and serving your music communities. I can't wait to see you all at National Convention at Nu Chapter in the Spring!



Now that formalities have been addressed, lets transition to the more important stuff. Since my last report, I have been focusing on revisions and overhaul for the position. The focus for this year will be shifting all of the Chapters to a new financial tracking system as well as revise the National Finance Policy to reflect our current standards and practices. However, what I really want to talk about is our Inter-Chapter Travel Fund. This fund is specifically set aside to reduce the financial burden

of Brothers looking to visit other Chapters for Fraternal events (specifically volunteer or pledging events). It has a few minimum requirements that need to be met in order to access the fund.

- 1. The distance must be more than 110 miles one-way.
- 2. The trip must be for one of the aforementioned activities.
- 3. A letter must be submitted to the NT from the Chapter President with the specifics of the trip (dates, participants, etc) expressing their consent to utilize the funds.
- 4. The funds can only be used for travel expenses (i.e. gas, lodging, tolls). This does not include tickets obtained for speeding/being pulled over, food, and other activities that participants may engage in unrelated to official Fraternity events.

This fund has had limited use in the past, and I really want to change that. I promise that this is not the last time that you will hear about this fund. If you have any questions or need help drafting the submissions to ensure they contain all of the necessary requirements, please do not hesitate to reach out to me! On a final note, I wanted to make a point to encourage anyone interested in running for National Treasurer to reach out to me. This period marks the halfway point of my term in this office, and I would like to take this chance to encourage anyone who would consider running for National Treasurer to get in touch with me. Although it may seem like a far ways out, it is never to early to start learning the ropes and what it truly entails to hold this position. Even if it's not finance; related I am always happy to have the chance to meet new people and chat!


I have also been learning the ropes as I worked with our insurance broker to renew our policy. With

When I heard one of our very own Brothers had been cast in Hamilton, I decided, "I am not throwing away my shot" to tell this story. The Clef got the opportunity to interview Tamar Greene, a Nu Chapter Brother, about all things from Brotherhood to Broadway!

How did you hear about Mu Beta Psi? What made you want to join?

I heard about Mu Beta Psi from being in the music department and just hearing students talk about it. I saw Brothers with genuine passion for music and I wanted IN!

What is your favorite Brotherhood memory?

My favorite memories will always be of us pledging. I have never felt so much Brotherly love and bonding.

What have you learned or gained from Mu Beta Psi that has helped you in your career?

I was Chapter Maintenance Officer for our Chapter. I truly learned how to handle issues that occur in large groups. This has helped me with teaching and music directing throughout my career.

What was the first show you were ever in?

My first actual show on stage was with my high school show choir group called SOTA Singers (School of the Arts). We did a show called All Night Strut. Before then, my time on stage was strictly as a pianist.

What was your favorite concert/show you were in during college?

I was fortunate to play Dancairo in the opera Carmen. They hired professionals for most of the other roles, so I had a chance to perform alongside professionals. It was my first exposure to performing an opera role, and it changed my outlook on a professional singing career.

What is your favorite part of being on stage?

I love moving people and telling a story that gets people to think differently about themselves and the circumstances of the world.

What shows have you toured with and what roles did you play?

I toured with the Broadway First National Tour of The Gershwins' Porgy and Bess and the First National Tour and North American premiere of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Love Never Dess, the seguel to Phantom of the Opera. Other notable productions and roles include: After Midnight (Quartet Leader), Ragtime (Booker T Washington), and RENT (Collins) to name a

What is your dream role?

My all-time dream role is Coalhouse Walker Jr. in Ragtime. It is an incredibly powerful and timeless show with a message that is just as relevant today as when it was originally conceived.

When did you first hear about or experience Hamilton?

In the late winter of 2015, my friend asked me if I wanted tickets to this show that she was working sound on. She thought I would enjoy it. It was playing at the Public Theater in NYC. I remember her saying that it was about the Revolutionary War. That's when I recalled hearing other actor friends talking about this new show that seemed like it was "Les Miserables but with hip hop". Ha! I was about to leave town to do Ragtime in Pennsylvania, so I couldn't take her up on that offer. Literally, weeks later, Hamilton was blowing up and EVERYONE wanted an audition. So while I was in Pennsylvania, I texted my friend to confirm that this Hamilton was the same show that she had offered me tickets to. She said yes. I said, "Ummm... Do you still have tickets?!?" and of course, she didn't! haha.

That summer, I was walking through midtown with a friend one Monday evening, wondering which shows were actually performing on Broadway's typical day off. We searched on Google and saw that Hamilton was one of the few shows that was performing. I never win ANYTHING, but we decided to try for rush tickets. Would you believe that I won the \$10 Ham4Ham tickets?!

I sat in the front row, in front of Joe Biden!! After it began, I don't even remember taking a single breath. This show had done it. It had succeeded in representing my people of color while also showing respect to the African American musical culture. I've never felt so moved.

What was the audition process like for Hamilton?

After I saw the show, I urged my agents to get me in the room. They tried a few times but I could not get an appointment. So I decided to take charge and go in for the general open calls. For hours, I waited in the line that wrapped the entire city block from early in the morning until late afternoon. It was rainy and cold, but I did it. Once I was finally inside, I performed my piece. It was a great audition that immediately garnered a callback.

The callback process for me was off and on over a three year period. During that time frame, I did other shows, traveled the world, and even did another national tour. Even when my callbacks didn't result in an immediate job offer, I continued to work on the material because I was so passionate about the show.

"I never lost faith that I would be in it one day."

For my final callback, I flew into NYC from tour, dealt with multiple flight delays and cancellations, slept for 2 hours, and walked into a room with Tommy Kail and Alex Lacamoire (the Tony-winning Director and Music Director of Hamilton). Extenuating factors

aside, I poured my whole heart into that audition and left the room knowing I had done my best.

Describe what you feel your character, George Washington, adds to the show.

In a world that was chaotic and undergoing revolution, George Washington is the

one solid and steady character that everyone looks up to. First as the General and then as President, George Washington is the patriarchal thread throughout the entire piece.

What is your favorite song from the show?

I think "Right Hand Man" is the greatest character entrance of all time. There is a buildup worthy of the great man that General Washington was. But, that said, my favorite number is "One Last Time." As Washington, I spend my entire show selflessly fighting for a better America. Everything is all worth it by the time we arrive at "One Last Time." Washington is ready to sit back, become a normal citizen of the colonies and watch the growth of his nation that they have worked so incredibly hard to establish.

What is your favorite lyric from the show?

There are SO many! I'll have to name a few. One of the things that makes this show so great is Lin Manuel Miranda's willingness to unapologetically discuss difficult subjects that were issues then and, even more shockingly, are still relatable issues today. During our current political climate, I really enjoy two different lines. In "Non-Stop," Hamilton says "corruption's such an old song that we can sing along in harmony". One of my own lines that I love is "I wanna warn against partisan fighting." These two lines are incredibly relevant to the trust (or lack thereof) in the government and the constant partisan battles between the current Democrat

and Republican (and other) parties. My last favorite line is "We plant seeds in the South. We create... Yeah keep ranting, we know who's really doing the planting." This is said by Alexander Hamilton to a braggadocious Thomas Jefferson in a Cabinet battle. Jefferson was referring to how well they are doing in the South, but when doing that, Hamilton calls out how completely ignorant it is of him to disregard the contributions that the African slaves gave to this country.

Any advice to give for aspiring theater performers?

The "no"s in this business can be extremely discouraging. I auditioned for Hamilton for three years! It was certainly a bummer when I didn't get it earlier, but I never let it get me down. 

reasons people may not attend music festivals.

I've never been to a music festival and don't know what to expect.

There are a wide variety of activities at music festivals. One that is near and dear to Alpha Chapter Brothers is Shakori Hills. It is only 45 minutes from campus and occurs twice each year: the first weekend of May and again the first weekend of October. This festival is one of the most family-friendly festivals out there. At Shakori Hills, there are four days of camping in the woods

New Orleans Jazz & Heritage Festival and Voodoo things happen, but those things also happen at Music + Arts Experience. Or, if you're looking for Scranton, Pennsylvania. And then there's one of my favorite festivals, Electric Forest Music Festival in Rothbury, Michigan (also heavy with EDM, but they festival is curated by the jam band The String Cheese Incident, so you also get some jam band goodness). And then there are the plethora of music festivals Park in Live Oak, Florida, which is a campground built specifically for music festivals! Shakori Hills even has a sister festival in Trumansburg, New York (Finger Lakes GrassRoots Festival of Music and Dance) in the summer and another one in Miami, Florida (Virginia Key GrassRoots Festival of Music and Dance) in the winter. And I'm sure there's something to be said about the spirit of music in there somewhere.

Music festivals are too expensive!

I'm sure the more financially-conscious of us probably wondered just how I could afford to attend 39 music festivals since I first discovered my love and passion for them a little over 10 years ago (almost four per year!). There certainly is a financial burden, but here's where service comes in! I've volunteered (or worked when volunteering wasn't an option) at many festivals to earn my tickets. Due to the temporary nature of the work required for a festival, they are highly driven by volunteers, and every festival needs hundreds of them! Even a small festival like Shakori Hills, with around 7,500 - 10,000 attendees, needs at least 400 volunteers (over a hundred are need just to run the kid's tent!). Thus, they need to attract a lot of volunteers, and they do that by offering tickets in return for your labor. Some of them even let you work before or after the festival so you don't have to miss out on the fun, and I've heard so many people say just how much they love the feeling of having contributed to the event. It really does create a huge sense of satisfaction having contributed to a musical event and seeing everyone enjoy the fruits of your labor.

Aren't music festivals where people go to just party and get... well, inebriated?

My response to that is, to be honest, yes, those

every small venue, arena, and amphitheater show. some jam bands, check out Peach Music Festival in That is why it's important to make sure you research each festival and make sure it offers the right experience for you and/or your family, and you just need to keep aware of your surroundings. Small do have a more jazzy/world music stage, and the festivals like Shakori Hills are great for families, and many other festivals are, too. But for all the things that happen at festivals, you won't find a more open and inviting crowd looking out for each other that occur at The Spirit of the Suwannee Music than at any of the festivals I've mentioned in this

The Story of Rho A Rho'd Trip Through Time: Rho Chapter Celebrates 10th Anniversary. By Veronica Tabor

Mu Beta Psi founded Rho Chapter at Northern Michigan University on November 16th, 2008. This November marks Rho's 10th anniversary! The Clef spoke to some of those involved with the Rho installation process to learn more about how our second Michigan chapter came to be ten years ago.



Rho Convention

Jill Paul was Rho's founding President. She got the initial idea for founding Rho Chapter from attending the Michigan Music Educators conference and learning about different music fraternities and sororities. "We wanted something on Northern's campus but knew that it would have to be co-ed to be sustainable". Paul found Mu Beta Psi's website and was initially frightened away due to the number of chapters all the way on the East coast. "Just as I was about to give up hope and continue my search, I noticed a picture of a Michigan Tech license plate... There was, in fact, a chapter at our rival school to the north. I decided to reach out to then NVPE Sarah Guthrie. From there I put together the petition (with the generous help of some very awesome Zetas)."

Rachael Dzbanski, another Rho founder, was recruited to Mu Beta Psi by Paul: "It looked like it would be a great chance to promote music in our area and bond with my fellow musicians. I was our first Pledgemaster so I was really involved with

learning the new information about Mu Beta Psi along with how I would have to teach it to our new members when we were off the ground."

As part of the installation process, Brothers from both Zeta Chapter at Michigan Tech and Nu Chapter at SUNY Oswego were heavily involved as Host Pledgemasters and Remote Bigs. Scott Nelson (current NVPE) was a Host Pledgemaster: "I was the Zeta Expansion committee rep at the time, so I was involved in the process from the second NVPE Sarah Guthrie told me we had a group of interested students. I met with the initial group of students interested, I helped them put together their petition, and I coordinated the formation of the colony with the NVPE and the NCE." Both Nelson and the other Host Pledgemaster Katie Sebeck drove to Marquette once a week (about two hours from Houghton) to

give information and administer a weekly quiz, but all Zetas lent a helping hand. "We also helped them develop all of the administrative stuff required to be an operational chapter, like editing their bylaws with Rob Smith and Bryan Sebeck, or developing their committee structure with Sandy Orlowski."

After the week of installation (see aside),

becoming a Brother of Mu Beta Psi was a highlight for both Dzbanski and Paul. "It was extremely stressful and perfectly imperfect but the amount of love and support we received that day was amazing", says Paul. "It felt like all of our effort and hard work was worth it," states Dzbanski. Rho Chapter Founding Brothers helped fulfill the four purposes during their time at NMU, as current active Rho Brothers do today. "I was always a part of the marching band when I was at NMU, and I eventually had leadership positions within that organization," says Dzbanski, "I think that helped me fulfill the first two purposes...I would come up in the summer to help recruit people into marching band and encourage people to be involved in music ensembles and classes". Paul had similar experiences: "During my time at Rho I spent a lot of time not only participating in NMU's ensembles but promoting the Marquette Symphony Orchestra, helping raise funds during the public radio stations pledge drives, and working with students at the local middle school".

The future of Rho Chapter rests with currently active collegiate Brothers. Paige Sullivan pledged in Fall

2017, and the reasons why she chose Mu Beta Psi can resonate with us all: "I had seen the Fraternity in the big book of organizations that I received at orientation so when I saw a Rush week poster I thought that it wouldn't hurt to just see what it was all about if I decided to join at a different time. After the first Rush week event, however, I felt like I had found something really

special. The group seemed like a family away from home. Sitting in a room full of people who have a common interest in music and a passion for helping the community seemed like exactly the place I wanted to be."

Many of the traditions followed by Rho chapter to

this day were put in place by the Host Pledgemasters and Remote Bigs during the colonization process. "Whether it was helping to sew the first set of 'Green and Gold' letters in Heather and Haley Vingsness's living room, writing the script for installation night, or helping them cut their first set of plaques. It's these traditions that I love to see continue a decade later," says Nelson.

The bonds of Brotherhood and tradition still hold strong at Rho Chapter. Relay for Life is an ongoing Rho tradition formed a few years after the installation: "It was so amazing to be able to contribute to something so important while still having a fun time. Staying up all night really helps you become better friends with your Brothers," says Sullivan. About the future of Mu Beta Psi, Sullivan

hopes for an increase in both number of Chapters and Brothers: "It is a big commitment but it is well worth all of the time and effort to be part of a family like ours."

As the Rho Founders approach the 10-year anniversary of their Brotherhood, Paul reflects upon her hopes for the future of Rho Chapter: "My hope for Rho is that it continues to grow strong and have a positive presence not only at NMU but within the Marquette Community." As any colonization experience now rests with alumni of Mu Beta Psi, and no current actives, Nelson encourages anyone interested in colonizing to reach out to him. "Colonization is both a simple process, when considered through the lens of a traditional pledging process, and a remarkably complex one that requires careful management within the National bureaucracy. As a past Host Plegemaster, I hope that I can take all of the good lessons I learned from Sarah and help a new generation of HPMs be as successful as Katie and I were with Rho." As Rho Chapter at Northern Michigan University has turned out nearly one hundred Brothers over its ten years and will continue to do so, we can count on future Rho Brothers to continue carrying out our purposes and maintaining our reputation of outstanding service and Brotherhood in Marguette.

"The week leading up to Installations was so insanely busy, I'm honestly not sure how I lived through it. We started the week out with a meeting of the National Committee on Expansion to recommend the approval of the Rho Charter, where Katie and I had to present our recommendations to the committee and have a formal vote. I drove to Marquette on Tuesday, to give the final set of information to the colonists and prepare them for the final exam. As a fun aside, I happened to get my first speeding ticket that night by driving Katie's green Subaru Outback "Lucky" 85 mph past Alberta, MI at 10:30pm. On Wednesday, I had to present the motion to Charter Rho Chapter to the NEC for approval. After the last test was turned in, I packed them all into my trusty red binder and drove back to Houghton. As was common for Thursdays at Zeta Chapter, we went straight to the Downtowner lounge for Pitchers of Long Islands.

When we got there we found the entire side room chock full of Brothers from every active chapter. Katie and I sequestered ourselves at a bar table in the corner as we carefully graded every single exam. When we finished the last exam, we guieted the room, and announced to all assembled that we had enough colonists to install Rho colony that weekend. The entire room erupted into celebration as all of the stress of that week, and the preceding 10 weeks just melted away. Some of the Zeta alumni present quickly got me a drink to raise a pitcher in toast and the rest is history. That feeling of utter relief of all of my anxiety about the week and the ensuing celebration with some of my closest Brothers was absolutely amazing and one of my favorite memories."

Historians Corner

Armistice Day and the 100th Anniversary of World War I By Nathaniel Kulyk, National Historian

↑ rmistice Day, held on November 11th every year, A commemorates the signing of the armistice between the Allied powers and Germany at 11am on November 11, 1918 - the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

Although hostilities continued in some areas, the armistice essentially brought an end to four years of fighting in the First World War.

French military commander Ferdinand Foch was tasked with leading the peace negotiations. The armistice was signed in his railway carriage in the remote Forest of Compiègne, north of Paris, at 5 am and came into force at six hours later, at 11am. Six months later, the Treaty of Versailles was signed and

later acted as the lasting peace treaty between the nations of the world.

CAPT. PRICE

The armistice forced the Germans to evacuate invaded countries and territories within two weeks. They also had to surrender a significant amount of war material, including five thousand guns, 25,000 machine guns, 1,700 planes. Germany, exhausted by war and with a nation of hungry citizens, reluctantly accepted the terms. It helped generate the post-war resentment which led to the rise of Adolf Hitler and the start of World War II.

The total number of military and civilian casualties in World War I was about 40 million: estimates range from 15 to 19 million deaths and about 23 million wounded military personnel, ranking it among the deadliest conflicts in human history. The United States entered the war in April 1917, after more than two and a half years of efforts by President Woodrow Wilson to not get involved. Under the

> command of Major General John J. Pershing, more than 2 million U.S. soldiers fought on battlefields in France. The official figures of military war deaths listed by the US Dept. of Defense for the period are 116,516. This includes 53,402 battle deaths and 63,114 non-combat deaths.

World War I ended



about seven years prior to the founding of Mu Beta Psi. Nevertheless, Percy Price played a role in the preparation of students who participated, albeit in a small way. Pictured here is the North Carolina State ROTC Band from the 1919 edition of the Argomeck yearbook. Here, then-Captain Price served as one of the directors of the band. It was due to his service with the ROTC -- and his assisting with the training of military cadets -- that Price later earned the title of Major.


Announcements
