The Historian's Corner



Historical research is often like a jigsaw puzzle. When you find and assemble the individual pieces, you are one step closer to having a complete picture. The interesting thing is that you don't have an illustration to work with that shows you what the final picture will look like. Sometimes the final picture changes or is enhanced in detail when you discover more information than you originally thought possible. With that, I would like to share with all of you some research that I recently did at the request of the granddaughter of one of our Brothers.

In late February, I was contacted by an alumnus of Kappa Kappa Psi, named Diane. She told me that she has a key necklace that was given to her by her grandfather, Isaac William Thorn. The key has the Greek letters for Mu Beta Psi and the initials IWT and the number 37 engraved on the back. She was interested in trying to confirm whether or not he was a Brother of our Fraternity. Based on the description of the key, I had a good feeling that he was, as initiated Brothers at that time would receive a key with their initials and the year of their initiation engraved on them. However, I also wanted to try and find some more information about him.

electronic copies of their yearbooks available online for public viewing. I reviewed the 1938 volume and quickly located Isaac Thorn's senior page, which included a picture and information about his major – which was Electrical Engineering – and his extracurricular activities included not only Mu Beta Psi, but the ROTC, band, orchestra, and being a baseball manager. I then went to the Mu sion, he served in both France and Beta Psi page in the yearbook and quickly discovered that not only was he a Brother, but he was also the President of Alpha Chapter! I shared my findings with Diane, who was very happy that I was able to help connect some of the missing dots for her. She in return shared some additional information about his life, which I would like to pass along to you.

Isaac William Thorn was born in August 1915 and grew up in Rahway, New Jersey. Known as Bill, he played clarinet in the Rahway High School band. At North Carolina State, he played both the clarinet and violin. He graduated in 1938 and married Marion Neven, a marriage that lasted over fifty years. They had two sons, William Richard, and Lawrence, as well as two grandchildren, Robert and Diane. During World War II, he was initially stationed in Fort Knox as a tank instruc-



er, he

and served on General Dwight Eisenhower's staff as a member of the Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Force (SHAEF) in preparation for the D-Day invasion at Normandy. Before the war's conclu-Germany. After briefly working for the Swift Meat Company and Bigelow Textiles, the family moved ultimately moved to Westfield, New Jersey in 1958. A fan of Dixieland music, college basketball, and the New York Yankees, he worked as an industrial engineer for F.M.C. Corporation until his retirement in 1982. He passed away at home in January 2001.

Brother Thorn is a wonderful example of the Greatest Generation, which grew up through the struggles of the Great Depression, sacrificed everything during World War II, and lived the American Dream in the second half of the 20th Century, seeking to build a better life for their children and grandchildren. I am very glad that this piece of history has been found and added to the puzzle! MBW

A Friendly Reminder

Have you ever wanted to contact a Brother from another Chapter who serves a specific role? I asked if them they had tried the most recent Address List. I would like to remind every Chapter that the three National Deadline dates every year are only a minimum. The intranet email lists are not the only location that require constant updates. National Policy requires that whenever a Chapter Officer, National Committee Representative, or Chapter Committee Chair that is reported on the Address List submission changes, the Chapter has two weeks from the date of the change to submit an updated Address List to the National Secretary.

This way, when the need or desire to talk to a specific person arises, the time can be spent talking, and not trying to figure out who to talk to. **MBU**

I'm glad to see everyone here in da UP. It has been a far busier year for the BOT than previous years, and that is not a bad thing. Though it feels like we've been talking a lot lately, our actual official last meeting was on November 7th, where we discussed much of the today's business in preparation. Since then, we have had several informal discussions in the intranet chat room since then, notably about the eligibility clause of the National Constitution and the appeal coming before the BOT in today's meeting. I'd like to thank everyone who came to those discussions and made them extremely useful, and recommend to the Chairman elected today to continue this mix of formal and informal meetings to promote activity on the Board.

For my Standards Advisory role. NVPCM Rosencrans has drafted an official Fraternity Seal, with the aim to reproduce and bring back to use this official symbol of the Fraternity. He and I have discussed it at length, and I've brought in NH Kulyk to help us determine the historicity of this Fraternal Seal. There is currently some discussion regarding the date, "April 1930," that appears on the seal. The assumption is that this is in reference to either the founding of Beta Chapter or the first National Constitution. The investigation into the correct date that should appear on the crest continues. I've also been watching closely the NITC continue to navigate the perils of living in the digital age, and advising on their policy changes and Convention workshop.

In our infinite spare time, I've been discussing the nature of the PBOT advisory roles with the other PBOTs. We're coming to the consensus that the roles ought to be updated and adapted to better serve the current Fraternity, but we're still working toward a recommendation to bring before this Board.

Finally, the topic of communication and education about the Board itself is currently on my mind. We've taken some steps this year to try and make the Board more visible to the active Brotherhood. For example, along with my policy-mandated letter of introduction in the fall, I also held an "Ask Me Anything" forum in the chat room. However, a common question we all continue to hear is "What does the BOT do?" I'd like to challenge all BOT members present, and those Chapter Presidents who be elected this year, to discuss how to make the BOT more visible to the Fraternity at large, and thus help the BOT execute its goals. **MB** Ψ

Brotherhood in Multitudes: Trust and Communication as the Basis for Chapter Stability

Our fraternity is embodied by a landscape of people, who come to music from backgrounds too many to mention. Anytime I reconnect with Brothers on the other side of the country, or when I meet somebody who is just beginning their journey in Mu Beta Psi, I am struck by how we all bring a perspective to our fraternity that nobody could replace. And as time goes on — as each of us continues to grow into the people we are meant to be — that sense of depth expands even further.

Over the last year, I have led a few workshops as part of the committee that I lead, and I have learned some challenging truths about the state of our fraternity's stability: we don't always trust each other, and we're so overwhelmed that it's hard to transition from one role to the next without leaving something behind.

Fraternity is founded on trust.

Even in the first couple weeks of the year, Brothers from every Chapter told me that they were observing instances of distrust among our Fraternity—instances, though often small and easy to overlook, where we were either too busy or too afraid to depend on one another. Chapter reports aplenty are full of instances in which we dropped the ball, or tasks that a Chair was afraid to delegate, or an outgoing representative that didn't have materials (or the time) to equip the next Brother. Trust is easy to speak to, but hard to live: trust is founded on being vulnerable, of accepting the weaknesses we have. And only once we trust each other, as Brothers, can we go on to other challenges like open dialogue, expressing our fears, and in expressing them, allow one another to truly help.

Fraternity depends on this kind of dialogue. Each of our Chapters is taking on tremendous challenges on campus. And some Chapters are especially troubled by low resources, not always having enough funding or active members to perform at our best. I have found that these Chapters struggle to stay connected to the wider organization, dropping connection to the National Organization, and also to the other Chapters who share their struggle and might otherwise be able to offer advice. It's hard to find the energy to send a message out about new Chapter reps, or to remember who to notify.

But these two key points — that of trusting and of communicating — are the very basis on which all Chapter stability relies. No policy or rule can compel us to do these things. You see, notes on a staff are not music in themselves; they are merely a guide to how to realize that music in the open air. Similarly, our Brotherhood is not manifested in some set of deadlines or checkboxes ... our Fraternity matters too much to reduce our feelings for one another to ink. Our landscape of people, people who live out the purposes of Mu Beta Psi every day on campuses near and far, is the embodiment of our Brotherhood. And as we continue on this ever-growing, ever-changing journey together, I hope we all can find a deeper sense of fraternity.

If in the coming year, you encounter obstacles to the sense of fraternity that you desire, then I hope that you will reach out to your Brothers. Speak up about what's missing, so we can all continue to grow. **MBΨ**

The National History and Archives Committee met on March 18, 2014 in the Brother's Chatroom. We discussed several topics, including the Oral History Project, submissions for the Fraternity Archives which are due on April 30th, and the status of the Historian's Website. The committee approved the 2014 edition of the Mu Beta Psi Prospectus, and discussed the idea of allowing for the submission of digital scrapbooks for the "Price"less Memories Scrapbook competition. I was very pleased with the discussion, as all committee members contributed and shared the views of their respective Chapters. While there were different viewpoints, it was ultimately the majority opinion of the committee not to allow digital scrapbooks to be submitted for the competition.

Over the past several months, I assisted the Alumni Association with looking to try and identify Brothers from inactive Chapters. I initiated several discussions with the Music Departments of colleges and universities where we have had a Chapter in the past about best ways to get in contact with alumni. This approach has not been all that successful. The next approach will be to contact the school's Alumni Associations to see if there is information that can be provided. From the historical standpoint, while conducting my research, I found information regarding our Brothers from Beta Chapter and Eta Chapter, including several images from digital yearbooks which were available online. This remains a work in progress, and I would like to try find additional information where possible in the coming year, as well as additional images for the Archives.

I am also pleased to report that the Fraternity Archives has received some additional items over the past few months which were donated by Chris and Traci Rodkey, alumni of Xi Chapter. These include the first "Sounds of Xi" cassette tape, and Xi Goat, the Chapter's mascot. Chapters are encouraged to contact me if they have any documents or items that they would like to either donate to the Archives, or send along a digital copy or image. I will make sure that these are added to the Historian's Website once it is up and running.

Since Convention 2014, I have reached out to all of the National Officers to see how I can be of assistance during the coming year. I spoke with NVPCM Nick Rosencrans about designs for a new Fraternity Seal for the National Organization, and spoke with NT Logan Brackett about ensuring that direct deposits for the Archives storage unit are transferred over in a smooth and timely manner. Additionally, I spoke with Haley Vingsness about the Historian's Website about getting the website up and running this year.

Finally, many thanks to the Chapters for their timely submissions for the Archives on April 30th! MBU
